


CCJJ Mission Statement

Current Task Forces & Subcommittees



Please note that the Commission and its task forces are engaged in ongoing work regarding minority overrepresentation through the analysis and discussion of data and information about the race/ethnicity composition of individuals involved in the justice system.



Current CCJJ Task Forces and Subcommittees

Legislative Subcommittee

Reviews the language of bills derived from CCJJ recommendations and determines whether legislation reflects the original recommendation intent. Members review legislation or legislative changes as bills progress through the legislature.



Current CCJJ Task Forces and Subcommittees

Mental Health/Jails Task Force

This Task Force has completed work in the areas of:

- Diversion from the system for those with behavioral health issues
- Diversion <u>within</u> the criminal justice system to keep individuals from returning to the jails

The current work is focused on:

 Provision of mental health services for individuals in jail with acute mental/behavioral health problems that are beyond the capacity of the jail to manage

Pretrial Release Task Force

This Task Force has completed work in the areas of:

■ The expansion of Pretrial Services statewide including the use of risk assessment tools, implementation of training standards and the use of a statewide court reminder system

The current work is focused on:

- Compliance with the 2013 legislation which modified pretrial release statutes
- Reform of Colorado's Pretrial System



Current CCJJ Task Forces and Subcommittees

Age of Delinquency Task Force

The current work on juveniles is focused on:

Examining intervention options, treatment services, and alternatives for 10-12 year
 olds

Future work will be focused on:

- Exploring options and approaches regarding the management of "transitional" populations (18-21 year olds)
- Reviewing repercussions associated with "mingling" younger (10-12 year olds) and older juveniles

Abuse of Youth in Custody Subcommittee

The current work is focused on:

 Studying whether there are gaps in existing criminal statutes concerning the issue of institutional abuse of children and youth in facilities operated in the Department of Human Services

Minority Over-representation

Review of the CLEAR Act (SB15-185): Analysis of race/ethnicity at major decision points in the justice system

In 2017, statewide

Blacks represented 4% of the adult state population and accounted for...

- 12% of arrests
- 11% of adult district court filings
- 10% of cases sentenced

Hispanic adults represented 20% of the population and accounted for...

- 29% of arrests
- 30% of adult district court filings
- 30% of cases sentenced



Minority Over-representation

Review of the CLEAR Act (SB15-185): Analysis of race/ethnicity at major decision points in the justice system

Last year, the Commission requested that the analysis be disaggregated by judicial district to assist local stakeholders in reviewing policies and practices

This resulted in 22 judicial district reports plus the statewide report, and an interactive dashboard for local stakeholders

This year, judicial district information is available on the interactive dashboard

2018 Legislative Recommendations

Mental Health/Jails Reform

Senate Bill 18-249:

Develop pre-file mental health diversion pilot program

- Develop post-arrest, pre-file diversion programs specifically for individuals experiencing mental health disorders and who meet specific criteria and are determined able to benefit from diversion to treatment rather than being processed through the criminal justice system.
- Create pre-file mental health diversion programs that utilize a stakeholder-created, reviewed and approved model. Promote the utilization of Adult Pretrial Diversion Programs and funding.



2018 Legislative Recommendations

Juvenile Justice Reform

Senate Bill 18-154:

Create a plan to formally recognize and address the needs of crossover youth

- Defines crossover youth and crossover plan in statute and requires each local Juvenile Services Planning Committee, established in C.R.S. 19-2-211, to devise a crossover plan for the identification and notification of cases involving crossover youth.
- Authorizes the utilization of existing marijuana tax revenue to be used to support the development and implementation of local crossover youth plans and services.



2018 Legislative Recommendations

Re-entry Reforms

House Bill 18-1344:

Allow Orders of Collateral Relief after the time of sentencing

 Allows eligible individuals to request an order of collateral relief after the time of sentencing. Creates an Order of Collateral Relief in the Children's Code.



2018 Legislative Recommendations

Re-entry Reforms

House Bill 18-1418:

Revise statutory guidance on state licensure and employment

Promotes community safety and economic growth by:

- Preventing consideration of arrests that did not result in a conviction, and convictions that have been pardoned, sealed, or expunged, in state licensure and employment decisions,
- Empowering the Department of Regulatory
 Agencies to delist certain conditional licenses, and
- Encouraging the elimination of mandatory collateral consequences.



2018 Legislative Recommendations

Community Corrections Reform

House Bill 18-1251:

Improve the efficiency of the community corrections transition placements

 The referral process will include revisions to these five elements of the process to refer inmates to community corrections 1)COV and Non-COV offender referrals, 2) Community referral packets, 3) COV and Non-COV offender program acceptance/approval process, 4)
 Community corrections boards utilize structured, research-based decision making, and 5) Repeal the statutory definition of Intensive Supervision Program-Inmate.



2018 Legislative Recommendations


Continuation of the Commission

House Bill 18-1287:

Continue the Colorado Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice

Extends the repeal date of the Commission to July 1, 2023 and requires a sunset review of the Commission prior to such repeal.

- The bill added four new membership positions and removed one position, increasing membership to 29 voting members and one ex-officio member.
- The bill requires the Commission, on evennumbered years, to request a letter from the Governor suggesting topics for Commission Study.

CCJJ 2019 Legislative Recommendations

Pretrial Release:

Require Pretrial Risk Assessment Tools

 Pretrial Risk Assessment shall be available and utilized by Judicial Officers in all counties throughout Colorado for purposes of setting bond and establishing conditions of release for felony and misdemeanor level offenses.

Expand Pretrial Services Programs Statewide

 Pretrial Services shall exist in all counties in Colorado and the Colorado General Assembly is encouraged to create a state formula program to incentivize local jurisdictions to develop and support pretrial programs and services.



CCJJ 2019 Legislative Recommendations

Pretrial Release:

Create a Statewide Court Date Reminder System

 The State Court Administrator shall develop and manage a program that is responsible for reminding criminal defendants to appear for their scheduled court hearings in the county and district courts of the state.
