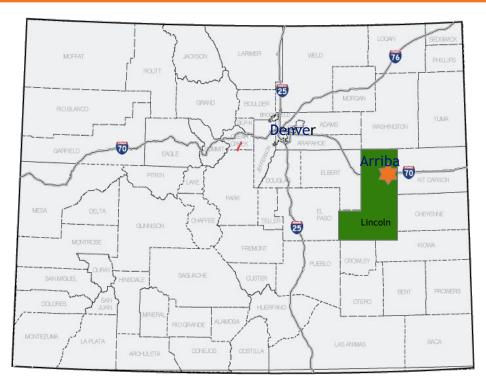

## Arriba Rest Area Overview



#### **LOCATION**

• 115 Miles east of Denver on Interstate 70 in Lincoln County.

#### **PRONUNCIATION**

 Originally pronounced Ah-ree-ba, today it is referred to as Air-Ah-Buh

#### **ABOUT**

- Built in 1995
- No Improvements since 1995
- CDOT's second busiest Rest Area with over 280,000 visitors per year







## Arriba Rest Area Project Overview

#### **REQUEST SUMMARY:**

• CDOT is requesting \$281,672 to fund environmentally friendly xeriscaping at the CDOT Arriba Rest Area in order to reduce water consumption.

#### WHY IS THIS NEEDED NOW?

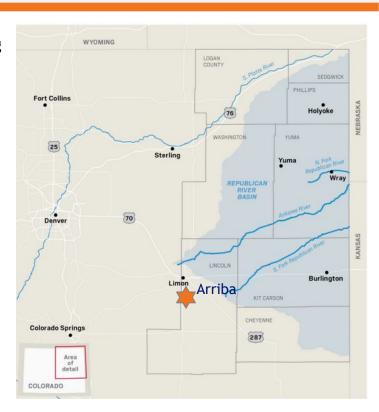
• Climate change is driving a historic drought throughout the Southwest. This proposal would save between 420,000 - 630,000 gallons of water per year and enable compliance with the Republican River Basin Agreement and the water reduction and water efficiency executive orders.

#### REPUBLICAN RIVER BASIN AGREEMENT:

 Arriba is located in the Republican River Basin. An agreement with neighboring basin states requires Colorado to reduce consumption of water from the basin by 2029.

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDERS:**

- This request would help meet the objectives of the "Greening of State Government" Executive order D 2022 016 by reducing potable water consumption.
- By installing water efficient landscaping, this project would be in compliance with the "Water Efficiency Landscaping Policy for State Facilities" Executive Order # D 2023 018.





## **CDOT Rest Areas and Funding**

#### **FUNDING FOR CDOT'S 26 REST AREAS**

 Prior to 2023, rest areas lacked a dedicated funding source.

#### TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION

• The TC established Rest Areas as CDOT's 12th Asset in order to dedicate funding in support of a sustainable rest area program for highway safety.

#### CDOT'S ASSETS

 Guaranteed annual funding with a mission of preserving CDOT's assets.

#### **REST AREAS ANNUAL BUDGET**

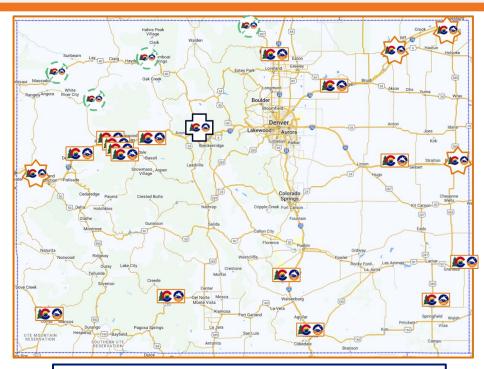
• \$4M across 26 rest areas

#### UNMET NEED

 CDOT has calculated an unmet need of between \$20M and \$30M to get all rest areas to an acceptable letter grade of C or better.

#### **REVENUE GENERATION IS PROHIBITED**

• Title 23 USC § 111 and CRS 43-2-101(3), prohibits Rest Areas from competing with commercial establishments. No gas stations, EV charging, or food services.







## Rest Area Challenges



#### LACK OF DEDICATED FUNDING PRIOR TO 2023

• The absence of dedicated funding resulted in the closure of seven (7) rest areas and most of the remaining 26 are in need of major repairs or reconstruction

#### MULTIPLE FAILING ASSETS AT EACH REST AREA

• The most remote rest areas also have fresh water and wastewater treatment plants that have reached the end of their useful life

#### DISTRIBUTION OF ANNUAL \$4M BUDGET

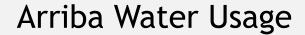
- \$600K for building maintenance and minor repairs split over 26 rest areas
- \$3.4M to for major repairs or reconstruction

#### THE AVERAGE COST OF A MAJOR REPAIR OR A RECONSTRUCTION

• \$3.5M

#### MOST MAJOR REPAIRS OR RECONSTRUCTION REQUIRE MULTIPLE YEARS OF FUNDING

 Backlog of major repairs and reconstructions provide few opportunities to address non-life safety projects or needs





# Water Consumption average over the last four years:

- Non-irrigated months
  - 95,000 gallons
  - \$1,800
- Irrigated months
  - 263,000 gallons
  - \$2,500

### Estimated savings with proposed plan:

- \$1,750-\$2,625 per year
- 420,000- 630,000 gallons of water per year







- Phase 1- Sod Demolition
  - Kill existing turf, aerate, and plow it under
  - 08/01/2025 01/01/2026
- Phase 2- Soil Stabilization and Plantings
  - Replace the irrigation system, drill new native seed
  - 0 04/01/2026 06/01/2026
- Phase 3- Landscape Stabilization
  - Monitor to establish xeriscaping
  - 06/01/2026 06/01/2027

Total cost: \$281,672
